Introduction from the Chair, Andrea Perry

The end of my stewardship as chair of THCAT has finished on high with Desmond Dekker Day in Trumble Gardens. It is a fitting end to my nine year involvement with THCAT as this will not only be my last year as chair but I am also standing down from the committee. I was there at the inaugural meeting in 2014 and over the years have dedicated a huge amount of time and energy to, I hope improving Thornton Heath.

My expectations were high and so of course I have faced many, many disappointments along the way but I have learned a lot, met some great people and achieved some key milestones in the history of Thornton Heath.

I have immersed myself in all things Thornton Heath. I was the vice chair of THCAT for six years representing the committee on the council's regeneration steering group.

I was involved in several campaigns for improvements to the High Street notably removing the benches which has seen a drastic improvement in anti social behaviour.

I set up a local newspaper The Thornton Heath Chronicle to give the area a voice which I ran with fellow THCAT committee member Vân Dang for more than five years. I helped run Thornton Heath's first street market, which included involvement in planning the magical light festival in Trumble Gardens. We organised an event to support Black Lives Matter on Ambassador House forecourt featuring local speakers.

I judged Thornton Heath's first three In Bloom competitions.

Joined countless action days picking up litter, planting flowers, painting murals and mosaics. We have done it all over the years!

I even stood as an independent candidate in the local elections for the Thornton Heath ward.

One of the most memorable night's was when Timberland took over the Ambassador House forecourt as part of a collaboration with the council and community to launch its global Nature Needs Heroes campaign. The forecourt was transformed in to a stylish music venue featuring Brit award nominee and local boy made good Loyle Carner and other artists.

It really was a brilliant night and is just one of many good memories I will take away from my association with THCAT.

But now is the time to hand over the mantle to new blood and find a new challenge. I wish the new committee all the best in continuing to deliver projects to improve the area.



Community Gardening at Ambassador House Forecourt

On the first Saturday of every month THCAT volunteers have continued to weed the planters and water the plants whilst carrying out a gentle litter-pick to keep this valuable green space tidy.

It is remarkable how many passers-by comment on how much they appreciate the area and take time out to sit amidst the flowers with lunch or a coffee.

There have been extra watering sessions during the drier weather and thanks go to the Copperstones' project manager and to the security team inside Ambassador House who let us fix a hose pipe to a tap several flights up.

Despite the difficulties of water pipe bans and an empty water butt, we are delighted that we managed to ensure most of the plants survived to keep this valuable nature space looking attractive. The bees certainly enjoy the flowers! Can you join us to help with planting (especially planting spring bulbs in September), weeding, watering and some litter picking? Also, we hope to re varnish the benches this autumn.



In November 2022 at Whitehorse Manor School on Brigstock Site James Haskell of London Ambulance Service (LAS) Public Education Coordinator, delivered a powerful presentation on the devastating effect of bladed weapon injuries (it's not just knives) and how important it is in saving a life when basic first aid can be administered before the emergency services arrive.

Around 40 people attended the session and hopefully all left with greater knowledge on how to help in these harrowing situations including knowing what information is needed over the phone by the emergency services.





James commented that this session, teaching specific first aid to the diverse local community, was groundbreaking and with enough further interest from community members, THCAT would like to organise another session.

Don't Mess with Thornton Heath How THCAT is making a difference

Our dedicated committee members Barbara Benjamin, Gaetane Jones and Paul Voden have continued to pound the streets and hold constructive meetings with Council officials to bring home the effects of the problems caused by flytipping and badly maintained licensed and suspected unlicensed Houses in Multiple Occupation (HMOs). Further meetings are planned with the council officers.

Barbara, Gaetane's and Paul's dedicated monitoring have seen a huge improvement in the cleanliness of a long standing problem alleyway behind some shops near The Pond and working with the site manager at the building on the corner of Brigstock Road and Frant Road is helping reduce the amount of flytipping.

A parade of shops on Brigstock Road is being monitored but, with the help of the Mayor of Croydon the landlord has been required to fence off his eyesore property.

Over the next 6 months the team's walkabouts are going to be concentrated in Thornton Heath Ward. There are longstanding issues around Woodville Road, Parchmore Road and its side streets. To press home the need for improvements in Thornton Heath Ward Barbara, Gaetane and Paul have been attending the councillors ward surgery at the Salvation Army (3rd Saturday of every month 11am to 12:30pm) to deliver a report on their findings. THCAT recommends that residents take advantage of councillors surgeries across all 3 wards.

During the walkabouts, Barbara, Gaetane and Paul realised that residents aren't aware of the LoveCleanStreets App. The team now provide the short instruction sheet on how to download and use the App (with QR code) to report fly-tips directly to the Council. Residents in Quadrant Road, Melfort Road, Cotford Road and Stuart Road have had leaflets delivered and more roads and streets will follow. The response from residents has been very positive.

Barbara, Gaetane and Paul feel that improvements have been made thanks to the co-operation of council officials and Cabinet Members. However, Barbara Gaetane they must back this up with their own constant and diligent monitoring of the streets and rogue landlords Thornton Heath and we are indebted and thankful for their efforts.




We are Thornton Heath Community App

It's been a super year for the app. Engagement has been high with over 1000 users having registered.

Local organisations still have the opportunity to sign up for a one-year free trial period. This grants access to the 'hub' that hosts all sorts of useful features including event and offer listings, targeted notifications, 'Geo Alerts', and a newly introduced forum. This forum gives Thornton Heath organisations a platform to connect with one another.

Volunteer groups can now use a code to access the hub features for free. For business users, post-trial access is still only £5 per month (£60 per year), with a handy nostrings cancellation option.

Tilly continues to manage 'We are Thornton Heath' with the support of Loqiva (the developers). Our success



has spurred the development of similar platforms in Wandsworth, Crystal Palace, Nottingham, Birmingham, and beyond.

We're looking forward to the possibilities that lie ahead, as we are already seeing evidence of the app being an invaluable local tool.

The Friends of Trumble Gardens (FOTG) (including THCAT committee members Andrea Perry and Graham Mitchell) are a relatively new group having been formed in September 2022 but since then they have held nine action days involving cutting back foliage, litter picking, refurbishing and re-painting the Ranger Hut on the Brigstock Road site.

Many THCAT members joined in the action days and the association was cemented when THCAT kindly granted the Friends of Trumble Gardens some funds to fit a new kitchen in the Ranger Hut along with the associated electrical and plumbing works.

The culmination of the remarkable year's work by the FOTG was Desmond Dekker Day on 19 August 2023. Some 250 people came to Trumble Gardens to listen to some great upbeat music by DJ Beatnik, Reggae Reminiscence Band and Desmond's Daughter Desrene. And to commemorate Desmonds's time in Thornton Heath a mural design was commissioned and provided by renowned artist, Bareface. Many brilliant local artists turned out to help paint the mural on the front of the Ranger Hut and it was amazing to see the talent amongst the younger children.
